

ATING TUO - CASE STUDY

Ating Tuo is a very remote, super needy community school that had been getting its water from the muddy, hand dug, shallow, well. The school has no actual buildings and so the kids study under trees. Sometimes when the wind is strong the blackboard falls over and hits either the teachers or sometimes the students.

At the school we met a young girl named Gillian Akullo. Who at the time was 13 years old and in 5th grade. She told us she had been very sick, and her description sounded to us like the symptoms of Bilharzia worms, which can be deadly if not treated. She told us her Mother had the same problem. It seemed logical that if they both had the worms then so did all of the local community that was using the same water hole as their source of drinking water. We offered to pay for her to go to the clinic and get tested and treated. They found that she definitely had Bilharzia and another infection, both were quickly treated.

We decided to take the test results to the sub-county health officials to see if they would come de-worm the children at this school. Now that there the school has clean water, bilharzia will no longer be a problem, and the school and surrounding community are very happy and much healthier.

2011 WAS A PIVOTAL YEAR

for Drop in the Bucket (Drop). After five years of working at schools and villages in East Africa, we began noticing and documenting a trend of increased enrollment and improved test scores at schools where we provided water and sanitation facilities.

Pushing toward our mission to keep rural children, especially girls, in school we targeted 50 at-risk schools and, with the participation of community, school and local leadership, began constructing water and sanitation facilities.

With each institution serving between 500 and 1000 pupils, this collective campaign resulted in, approximately 35,000 children now having clean water at their schools.

IMPROVED SANITATION AND HYGIENE

facilities also play a crucial role in enabling girls to attend and continue school throughout adolescence. In keeping with our steadfast commitment to empowering these young girls, in 2011, Drop also constructed four sanitation systems at schools in the Lango sub-region of Uganda.

All of this enabled these young minds to attend class, focus on their studies, and think about their futures.

It is widely recognized within the development community, that for progress to occur in these regions, it is essential for everyone to recognize the importance of educating the youth, particularly the girls.



INVESTMENTS IN GIRLS' EDUCATION

Working alongside village groups, school administrators, and local leaders we are starting to pinpoint key factors that impact school attendance rates and are beginning to address them.

Top among the issues impacting education are household finances. In an effort to address this we began forming Village Savings and Loan Associations, in conjunction with many of our water projects.



THIS PAST YEAR,

Drop formed 13 Village Savings and Loan Associations, which provide a simple system of borrowing, lending and saving community money.

We are documenting the success of these groups in stimulating small-scale economic growth at the village level and providing the additional financial support often needed to keep children in school. They also serve as an organized managerial structure for the water resources.

As the year came to a close, we received a generous donation from UNICEF of two Land Cruiser trucks to assist in our work in Northern Bahr el Ghazal, South Sudan. We then began setting up or offices and hiring local staff.

Overall, it has been an amazing year filled with challenges, growth, lessons learned, and victories. I would like to share our sincere appreciation for your support and involvement as we work to help the children of East Africa receive an education and a fair shot at life. Thanks so much!




